# Future Landscapes

### <u>Future Landscapes: "The sound of burning coal is the sound of politics." A new podcast series</u> <u>listens to places that tell the story of humanity's future in the face of climate change.</u>

Future Landscapes turns to sound in the exploration of possible new narratives and future scenarios in areas that pose a complex set of problems to humanity in the context of climate change: food and energy production and emission management.

This eight-part documentary series follows a sonic expedition led by philosopher Lukáš Likavčan and field recordists Sara Pinheiro and Magnús Bergsson, whose special microphones are able to capture the innermost technological processes and natural phenomena that our ears can't hear. Their attentive listening builds the ground for an exciting journey of thought on the human capacity to come up with solutions, as well as the critical power of sound itself.

Each episode of Future Landscapes is devoted to one location in the Czech Republic and Iceland, countries that seemingly represent two very different approaches to tackling climate change — from a traditional coal-fired power plant and the futuristic underground storage of CO2 to one of Iceland's hottest tourist spots, a lagoon formed by a melting glacier. What emerges is a mosaic of the hidden sounds of our civilization that may hold the key to dealing with the most imminent climate threats.

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## Protagonists

**Lukáš Likavčan** is a philosopher focusing on ecology, technology and visual cultures. Currently a Global Perspective on Society Postdoctoral Fellow at the Center for AI & Culture at NYU Shanghai. Previously, Likavčan studied philosophy at Masaryk University, where he also obtained his PhD in environmental studies. He also held visiting research positions at Wirtschaftsuniversität Wien and Hong Kong Polytechnic University; faculty positions at the Strelka Institute for Media, Architecture and Design as well as the Center for Audiovisual Studies at FAMU in Prague; and fellowships at the Academy of Fine Arts and Design in Bratislava and BAK, basis voor actuele kunst, Utrecht. He is the author of *Introduction to Comparative Planetology* (Strelka Press, 2019), which analyzes the representation of the Earth from the perspective of climate change geopolitics.

**Sara Pinheiro** is a sound-maker, who carries out sound recording, editing, foley and mixing for film and video art. In her solo practice, she makes acousmatic pieces, usually for multichannel performances, radio broadcasts or installations. She is a member of the live-coding group K-o-l-e-k-t-i-v and collaborates with Bystrouška Sound Studios in Prague. She is a lecturer at the Center for Audiovisual Studies at FAMU in Prague and a guest lecturer at the Institute of Sonology in the Hague.

**Magnús Bergsson** is a field recordist and sound enthusiast who since the 1970s has been recording sounds of both the natural environment and city life while publishing them in a vast online archive titled Hljóðmynd (Soundimage). In his work, Magnus is interested in recording places that are under great pressure due to global warming and where biological diversity is expected to change in the coming years. As a member of the music collective called Minningar, he is dedicated to documenting the tragic beauty of the Icelandic glaciers as they disappear due to human indifference. As a solo artist, he has recorded ambient sounds (ambiances) for several films and worked with various composers who have used field recordings in their music creation.
